Dates and Information

Apply at www.ucd.ie/apply by 8 March. Offers will be made on a rolling basis and applications will close when the courses reach capacity. The course code for the two week on-campus course is CT26 and the course code for the four week on-campus course is CT28. The cost per 5 ECTS is €1,500* which covers tuition, cultural and social events. Classes start on the second Monday in June.

Eligibility

The minimum GPA requirement is 3.0. As part of the online application process, you will be required to upload a copy of your passport, a letter of recommendation from an academic reference and a transcript of your academic record to date.

Summer School Overview

The programme consists of a two week tuition period with an option to spend an additional two weeks whereby students undertake further research activity.

In week 1 and 2, there are two courses to choose from and students may take one or both of these. The Health Systems course offers the opportunity for students to learn about and critically analyse the main types of healthcare systems found around the world. The other course is Evidence Based Research for Healthcare. The purpose of this course will be twofold: first to introduce students to research designs most commonly used in healthcare research and secondly to facilitate students in the learning of skills relating to the retrieval, critical appraisal and research evidence to healthcare practice.

Students who choose to spend an additional two weeks have the option to take the extended Critical Appraisal of Research for Healthcare course, which involves attending classes during weeks 1 and 2, and in weeks 3 and 4 students develop a portfolio of research evidence and attend two mentor led group sessions in areas such as clinical audit, Lean methodology, clinical research centres, systematic reviews and clinical trials.

Cultural and Social Programme

To enhance your experience at the UCD Health Sciences Summer School, a variety of cultural and social activities will be organised to allow you to explore and discover the history, traditions and beauty of Ireland whilst meeting people from across the world.

With a beautiful backdrop of city, countryside and sea, you can enjoy an enriching cultural and social adventure to complement your academic course.

During the weekends there will be the additional opportunity to visit Irish wonders such as the Cliffs of Moher, Blarney Castle and the Titanic Quarter in Belfast, giving you a full flavour of summer in Ireland.

State of the art Facilities

UCD has a population of around 30,000 people and is home to all of the facilites you would expect to find in a small town. You will find almost everything you need on campus, including shops, cafes, a post office, a bank, a medical centre, a pharmacy and much more.
